With the December Presentation of our Upper School students and Visitors' Day of our Lower School students behind us, it is time to think earnestly about our Spring Performances. This year's performances will take place on March 8 and 9 in Bowker Auditorium at the University of Massachusetts. We hope you will attend one of our performances in support of a specific dancer or all of Amherst Ballet more generally. A ticket order form is included in this newsletter; we hope you will use it!

There is always so much to do to create a performance. Of course there are the many hours of class and rehearsal for our students/performers and their teachers and choreographers. There are the arrangements to secure a theater, lighting designer and stage manager as well as the front-of-house details involving ticket sales, ushers and refreshments. While I make many of these arrangements personally, our board of directors and parent volunteers are also called upon to help. And that they do so willingly makes my job so much easier to accomplish.

And then there are the costumes. Amherst Ballet has always been known for its costumes. Since the days of our founder Therese B. Donohue's first ballets, Amherst Ballet's costumes have been out of the ordinary. This year is no exception and I am working with a wonderful group of parents with a remarkable can-do attitude. These parents have scoured our store of costumes for the basis of this season's costumes. I have shopped for fabric with these parents and spent time on-line pouring over ready-made costumes that can be customized to my specifications. These parents have done their own research and shown me designs and accessories to turn plain white tutus into little jewels and have also been assisted by the expertise and skill of faculty member Joanna Duncan who is

also constructing a number of costumes. Our board of directors held a successful fundraiser specifically to raise fund for tutus. Several of our dancers performed at Northampton's First Night and the "AB Sewing Circle" worked over the holidays to have their costumes ready in time. (Perhaps you saw the photo from First Night of our three *Sleeping Beauty* Jewels in the Daily Hampshire Gazette in January!?) Special thanks go to Margaret Arsenault, Joanna Duncan, Linda Ho, Kara Leistyna, Karen Schweitzer, Heidi Stemple and Kris Tyrrell for their hard work, good cheer and talents.

Our students love to perform. Knowing that, I was eager to accept the invitation to perform *Peter and the Wolf* with the Smith College Orchestra at the end of March. Fourteen of our students (mostly from the Lower School) will be performing along with Bob McGrath of

It Takes A Village:

The Summer Reconstruction Project

When I joined the board of directors of Amherst Ballet almost two years ago, there was talk about fixing up the upstairs dressing rooms and updating our director Catherine Fair's office. This summer, we finally did it!

An enormous amount of work was done to achieve the changes and the list of volunteers who pitched in (see below) is long. Many of you may not have an idea of what was really accomplished. When we started, the upstairs space was like a rabbit warren of small rooms containing two small dressing rooms and a costume closet. It was clear this year that our large Upper School student body would need more dressing space. And the bathtub filled with costumes in the upstairs bathroom – a throw back to when AB was someone's home – was taking up valuable room. The whole process reminds me of a book...

Prologue: Before any construction could even be done, the costume closet had to be emptied. Karen Schweitzer and I led a group of parents, dancers, and board members in moving all the costumes. This was quite a job, but we discovered a treasure trove of goodies in the process that you are sure to see on stage in the future. Many of the costumes were moved to storage high up in the downstairs dressing room and many were moved temporarily (I hope!!) to my home.

Chapter one, Demolition Day:

(President), Delcie Bean (Treasurer), Mitch Gaslin (Secretary), Jack Wileden, Office Manager Andrea Leibson, dancer Maddison Stemple-Piatt and I arrived with sledge hammers, crow bars, and an assortment of tools befitting a professional construction crew. With a swing of our President's hammer, we began the destruction that completely gutted the upstairs dressing room, left a hole in the bathroom floor and nearly flooded (don't

ask) Mrs. Fair's office. During the day, we threw debris out the window, carried a cast iron tub down a flight of stairs, got bruised, dirty, and sweaty. The huge dumpster (donated by Dave Duseau) was filling rapidly. When we were done, we were exhausted and excited at what we had accomplished. We were proud. Then we surveyed the damage. Who was going to put AB back together? And, all before Mrs. Fair returned from vacation and the summer campers began to arrive!!! We were nervous...

Chapter two, Clean Up and Painting: With our demolition crew back for a second day, a handful of Diamonds (board Vice-President Robin, former AB dancer Jillian, and brother Spencer), and one professional contractor and AB dad Chris Loftfield, we finished filling the dumpster. With Chris taking on the jobs that required expertise, we started with the upstairs bathroom, laying a new bathroom floor. Wallpaper was stripped from walls and the painting

began. Dancers, parents and Mrs. Fair volunteered in shifts and the formerly dingy space started looking lighter and more inviting.

Chapter three, Andrea, Heidi, and Maddison Go Shopping: In a day trip to Ikea in

Connecticut, we managed to get everything we needed to fix up the dressing room. We almost had to leave Maddison behind because the van was completely full. Jack was in charge of building the wall units ("some assembly required") which hold the dance clothes for our 40-plus Upper School dancers. New light fixtures and insulating blinds were also installed in the new dressing room.

LiLi Johnson

an accelerated dancer

When you watch LiLi Johnson dance, it is difficult to believe that she only put on her first pair of ballet slippers at age 13! But it's true, that's when she started dancing at AB. To be fair, she did take a Chinese Dance class with AB founder Mrs. Donahue when she was little—an experience she only vaguely remembers. Mrs. Donahue encouraged her to take a ballet class at the time, but LiLi was uninterested. It wasn't until years later that she regretted not giving ballet a try and she signed up for a teen beginner class. She wasn't a beginner for long.

LiLi jumped into ballet the way this self-proclaimed over-achiever jumps into everything—with both feet. According to AB's Artistic Director Catherine Fair, LiLi is an excellent student with natural talent who takes in every detail given by her teachers. Mrs. Fair continued, "It is an absolute pleasure to teach her." This past summer, LiLi attended both the American Academy of Ballet summer program at SUNY Purchase and the Joffrey Ballet summer camp with 15 other AB dancers. Both strengthened her rapidly improving ballet technique.

But it's not just technique that ballet has given LiLi. One thing she likes about AB is that she has made friends of different ages and from different schools—people she probably wouldn't have otherwise met. She enjoys a peer group that spans all the ages and levels of AB dancers. In New York City, during the Joffrey trip, she was both a role model and den mother of sorts for the younger dancers.

LiLi also sees dance class as a great place to let go of a stressful day. Somewhere, she says, to be able to "get out of my head and just think about the dancing." And with a full academic load as a senior at Amherst Regional High School — including two languages (Chinese and French) — LiLi has a lot of stressful days.

In order to achieve her goal of becoming a cardiothoracic surgeon, LiLi plans to study pre-med perhaps with double majors in math and dance. But, first, she has a big year with AB. Because of her late start, she has not been on stage much (two years as a village elder in *The Arctic* and last year's *Hungarian*

Festival of Dance corps). This year, though, she will be in the spotlight quite a bit with roles in both the *Five Elements* modern piece as "Wood" and in *Sleeping Beauty* as the "Ruby" jewel. Catherine Fair has this to say about LiLi: "though she came to ballet relatively late, as a high-school freshman, her work ethic, teachable nature, and natural talent have enabled her to catch up to her peer group, join Level C, and even earn a role as a jewel in the *Sleeping Beauty* Pas de Quatre."

LiLi is, in her own words, "so, so, so, so excited."

When you ask her about dance, LiLi will tell you "I'm not a dancer, I just love dancing." But watching her, we know that she is indeed, a dancer. Lucky for us, it is at AB that she loves dancing.

Mariel Adams

It is not stretching the truth to say that Mariel Adams has probably been dancing since before she was born. Her mother is a dancer and her father a musician, so she was immersed in music and dance from day one. Since then, Mari's passion, curiosity and skill for dance have led her to accumulate a wide variety of dance styles including ballet, modern, swing, lindy hop, salsa, latin, tango and contra dancing!

A "very, very energetic child," Mari, danced and bounced and performed at home before she took formal dance lessons. She joined Amherst Ballet for one year when she was nine years old. Then while accompanying her mother to swing dances, she began to pick up what eventually has become her favorite and most extensive dance form - swing dance. In fact she came back to ballet in order to improve her swing technique!

Mariel returned to Amherst Ballet in 8th grade and rediscovered a love for ballet. "Ballet is so beautiful and graceful. It gave me better balance, poise, strength and technique that I took to all my other dance forms." She started in Level 5 and moved quickly into the Upper School. In her first year, Mari performed in *Shim Chung* as an eel and as coral and in *Swan Lake* as a Polish dancer. Besides ballet and swing, she also loves modern dance. "Modern gives me the chance to express myself. It's more innovative and free, and I love that." She combined her ballet and modern training in two performances of *The Arctic*, first as the Mama Polar Bear, and last year as the tender and high-flying Mama Wolf. Anyone who has ever seen Mari on stage can see that she loves being there and that joy radiates from her as she dances.

Mari's stage experience extends far beyond dance and Amherst Ballet. She performed in her first musical theater when she was only seven years old at a performing arts summer camp production of *Fiddler on the Roof*. She went on to perform every summer there until she was 12. Back at home; she landed the role of Bielke - the youngest daughter in the Amherst Leisure Services' production of *Fiddler*. She performed for LSSE several times, then went on to perform in every musical offered at Amherst Regional High School, where she is now a senior. She even choreographed for them in *Urinetown* and *Cats!* This year she will perform in their production of *Aida*. If that were not enough, she also sings with the Chorale, an audition-singing group at the high school.

Academically, Mariel takes honors classes and is applying to colleges to study psychology and film. Oh yes, she also loves film, and in fact made the first documentary ever about Amherst Ballet, shown to

critical acclaim at the Amherst Ballet holiday sleepover in December.

Although Mariel is a member of many performing communities, Amherst Ballet holds a special place in her heart. "Amherst Ballet keeps me going. Sometimes I lose determination and motivation, but the consistency and support at Amherst Ballet refreshes my adrenalin. The atmosphere is welcoming, friendly and encouraging. We are not competitive, but determined to be our best. I am there because I want to be there. It makes me happy to be there." She speaks about the new student board also with pride. "It makes me feel good to help younger students. I remember what it was like coming in 8th grade and I want to help them to feel more comfortable. I like being a mentor to younger students." She adds, "Dance has helped me be more confident, outgoing and comfortable, (and) having a supportive dance community makes you more self-supporting."

In this year's performance, Mariel will perform in two roles that reflect her personal style as a dancer (minus swing.) It will be a pleasure to watch her in the *Latin Piece* and the modern, *Space Oddity*.

Good luck Mariel, in all your future performances on stage singing, dancing and acting, and off stage behind the cameras. We will miss your infectious smile, powerful leaps and warm, positive attitude.
